AMY LOWELL (18974-1925)

"During a career that spanned just over a dozen years, she wrote and published over 650 poems, yet scholars cite Lowell's tireless efforts to awaken American readers to contemporary trends in poetry as her more influential contribution to literary history. "Poet, propagandist, lecturer, translator, biographer, critic . . . her verve is almost as remarkable as her verse, "opined poet Louis Untermeyer in his 1923 work American Poetry since 1900. A collection of Lowell's work, published posthumously as What's O'Clock?, was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry in 1926." (©The Poetry Foundation)

Lowell was an early proponent of "free verse" poetry. She was also influenced by and championed the imagist school of poetry. Consequently her poems have a more contemporary feel than a lot of early 20th century poetry. Untermeyer also remarked about Lowell: "She was upon the surface of things a Lowell, a New Englander and a spinster. But inside everything was molten like the core of the earth... Given one more gram of emotion, Amy Lowell would have burst into flame and been consumed to cinders."

FROM THE COMPOSER

Poet Amy Lowell captures the rush, the exhilaration of riding a horse through a snowy field on a bright, brisk winter day. There are those experiences, often while out in nature or in the wild, when physical boundaries disappear and one loses oneself in a joyful, timeless realization of oneness. Lowell's "A Winter Ride" is such an experience! It is to be sung with joyful abandon. Tempo and dynamic instructions are explicit and best be followed.

Joan Szymko's choral music is regularly performed at national and international choral festivals, competitions and conferences. While using a familiar music vocabulary, she creates works that are nonetheless fresh and engaging. The American Choral Director's Association recognized Szymko's lasting impact on the choral arts in America by selecting her as a recipient of the prestigious Raymond W. Brock Memorial Commission in 2010. Szymko lives and works in the beautiful Pacific Northwest. A dynamic conductor, she has served on the choral music faculty of Portland State University and has led Aurora Chorus as Artistic Director since 1993. 
